FIVE YEARS THAT MADE A DIFFERENCE

In 2010 the world community came together in order to improve the livelihoods of millions of people in developing countries by changing their way of cooking. Mainly women and children have been, and many of them still are, suffering from health problems caused by smoky, toxic fires, and poorly designed stoves used for preparing food. Based on the vision to enable 100 million households to adopt clean and efficient cookstoves and fuels by 2020, 19 partners under the leadership of the United Nations and the World Health Organization founded the Global Alliance for Clean Cookstoves. In 2011 IFHE joined the Alliance as "Champion Partner" and on behalf of IFHE the Programme Committee Household Technology & Sustainability (PC HT&S) is supporting the Alliance's vision and mission.

Today the number of partners cooperating in the Alliance has risen from 19 in 2010 to 1300 UN Agencies, Research & Academic Institutions, National Governments, NGOs and Private Sector Enterprises. The Alliance has mobilised more than 400 million USD global investment in the clean cooking sector. The leadership council and the ambassadors of the Alliance have raised worldwide awareness for household air pollution and the benefits of clean and efficient stoves and fuels. The partners of the Alliance have created a thriving market that promises a sustainable development towards a clean cookstoves and fuels sector. Since 2010 the number of households using improved stoves and fuels is raising steadily. 28 million stoves were sold in 2014 and by 2016 a number of 63 million stoves is expected. The market penetration

of clean cookstoves overrides the projections made in 2010 significantly.

In addition to the efforts made in creating a market, the Alliance supports cookstove and fuel testing centres in 14 countries around the world and 28

nations are engaged in the development of ISO-approved standards for cookstove performance testing. The Alliance has trained and supported 300 women entrepreneurs through the Alliance's Women Empowerment Fund and the Alliance's Clean Cooking Catalogue gives information on product and performance data for nearly 300 stoves. Results from more than 40 research studies supported by the Alliance on the topics livelihoods, environment, gender and health can be accessed freely. The Global Alliance for Clean Cookstoves highlights 10 points of knowledge that have been derived by these studies and will drive further work:

1. Household air pollution causes 4.3 million deaths a year. In 2010 the WHO estimated a number of 1.9 million premature deaths. Today we know that cardiovascular disease from smoke inhalation has to be included in the figure.
2. Household air pollution is still the most important environmental risk factor, higher than unclean drinking water and poor sanitation.
3. Household air pollution is responsible for up to 25% of black carbon emissions globally.

4. Household air pollution is the leading cause of non-communicable diseases among women in developing countries.
5. The amount of 4.7 billion USD is needed globally to ensure universal access to clean cooking energy through 2030.
6. Women are willing to give up their traditional stoves and adopt clean cookstoves and fuels.
7. Women entrepreneurs are more successful at selling cookstoves and maintaining customers than their male counterparts.
8. New biomass stoves are approaching the efficiency emissions levels of LPG or biogas burning stoves.
9. People do not need to move up the energy ladder from solid fuels to biogas.
10. Leading humanitarian agencies recognise access to energy as having a direct impact on health, safety and livelihoods, and are now including energy products as part of their emergency distributions alongside food and shelter (Source: Global Alliance of Clean

Cookstoves. Five Years of Impact 2010-2015 Report, New York, 2015).

Based on these ten points the Alliance will build on the previous successes and keep on working toward the goal that 100 million households will adopt clean and efficient cookstoves and fuels by 2020. The Alliance will remain committed to the successful market-based approach that champions the issue at the global level while building local capacity in order to ensure long-term sustainability.

A lot of work has been done and the work of the Alliance has been more than successful as the Alliance's partners overrode their midterm goals projected in 2010. The Alliance celebrates great success but, at the same time, the projects have even more ambitious goals: Besides saving the lives of 640000 people, creating 2.1 million jobs and saving 1.9 million trees it is expected to save 1.6 billion metric tons of CO₂, to reduce the fuel use of households by 61%, to save 6.2% of household income and 102 hours of collecting firewood, annually.

ADVANCING RESEARCH AND EDUCATION ON SUSTAINABLE LIFESTYLES (SL), MORE-SL WORKSHOP IN VIENNA

Under the roof of the 10-Year Framework of Programs (10YFP) for Sustainable Production and Consumption, the United Nations Environment Programme (UNEP) established several programmes to reach the sustainable lifestyles. Their overall aim is to make sustainable lifestyles desirable, beneficial and accessible for everyone, enabled, supported and encouraged by all sectors of society, including governments, the business sector and civil society. The objectives of the programme are to:

- build a shared vision of sustainable lifestyles; achieve a common framework of understanding of sustainable lifestyles through multi-disciplinary approaches.



- integrate sustainable lifestyle principles and practices across all sectors of society.
- develop tools and incentives, provide capacity-building for achieving sustainable lifestyles and disseminating good practices.
- empower individuals to adopt sustainable lifestyles through education, awareness-raising and participation.
- measure and track the benefits of action targeting lifestyles.

One special activity of the 10YFP focusses on “**Mobilising research and knowledge for understanding and expanding the adoption of sustainable lifestyles**” (MORE-SL).

A group of 25 expert members met in Vienna on 20th November 2015 for a workshop, among them IFHE Members Dr. Sylvia LOREK and Dr. Stefan WAHLEN. The aims of the workshop were:

- To develop a coherent understanding of the role of sustainable lifestyles research and education within the transition to sustainable production and consumption systems.
- To develop strategy and working plans for the MORE-SL and TRANSFORM initiatives and explore their collaboration.
- To create a project management model for MORE-SL and TRANSFORM and their collaboration.
- To develop separate and collaborative fundraising strategies and proposals.
- To discuss institutional and administrative support.

The MORE-SL participants teamed up with colleagues from the “TRANSFORM” and “PERL” initiatives, both engaged in the 10YFP as well.

The workshop participants focussed on four areas. An “**Action plan to promote education for sustainable lifestyles**”, presented by Victoria THORESEN, Chair of the TRANSFORM working group was discussed. The second area was

“Regional approaches for cities”.

The perspective of MORE-SL cities by virtue of their critical mass (or density of networks) offers much greater system level potential at a scale that would yield better results than encouraging

incremental shifts at the individual level. Another important working field of MORE-SL is “**Framing on Communication**”. Communicating sustainable lifestyles is an important issue in the context of a transformation to sustainable lifestyles. One working group

focused on scenarios in different areas of societies and discussed which key questions should be answered through research.

The participants discussed which ways might be the best to promote sustainable lifestyles? Which questions must be answered through research? And which concepts should be developed? One key aspect was the development of a resource platform for all existing and future research findings, documents, tools, best practices. The participants agreed that in the past many valuable papers, books, conference results, books, toolkits and best practices were published. But for many actors, stakeholders, and teachers it is difficult to find and adapt those documents. For example there is still a big gap between the existing knowledge regarding education for sustainable development and the current transformation in schools. As a result of the MORE-SL key questions for specific research areas and required concepts were discussed.


The theme of World Home Economics Day 2016 is “Home Economics Literacy”.

IFHE REGION AFRICA: CONFERENCE IN EGYPT

Report on the 1st International Conference on Family Wellbeing and Sustainable Living 2015 and the 7th IFHE Africa Regional Meeting, hosted by the Department of Home Economics – Alexandria University, Egypt.

“Advance United Man & Woman: A new pathway to family wellbeing and sustainable living” on 25th – 26th October 2015 at Bibliotheca Alexandrina, Alexandria, Egypt. The purpose of the conference was to bring together as many Home Economists and other related disciplines from Africa and around the world to join hands in strengthening Home Economics, family and consumer studies in Africa and find a new pathway to family wellbeing in the future we want.

The value of the conference was in the unity coming from the IFHE meeting with all African regions together, and with some international colleagues. The conference participants discussed different family issues from a Home Economics perspective e.g. the role of Home Economics for gender equality; the role of the consumer in sustainable living; family cohesion; strengthening family wellbeing and sustainable living through Home Economics; a husband's participation in household tasks; communication skills and its relationship to marital adjustment; women's knowledge about breast cancer and their attitudes towards breast self-examination; and using household technology to develop employed women's skills in producing

fortified bread. There were issues relevant to food, nutrition and family health e.g. proposing special food protein patterns for possible prevention of some liver cancers, Gibberellic acid and the protective effect of soybean and the evaluation of the leaves and seeds of Moringa, which was very attractive. Home Economics education was discussed and textiles research as well. Prof. Sidiga WASHI, IFHE President-Elect and Prof. Hester STEYN, IFHE Vice-President Region of Africa had an interview on a local TV channel talking about IFHE around the world and in Africa. Mona Sharaf ABDELGALIL talked about IFHE and Home Economics in Egypt as a liaison and conference co-chair. In five workshops experts presented aspects of different skills in Home Economics education to increase the capacities and skills of family members for establishing small business projects. We would like to offer our thanks and appreciation to all participants from Egypt and participants from Africa whose presence added great value to the conference; the IFHE President-Elect Prof. Sidiga WASHI, the Vice-President for Africa Region Prof. Hester STEYN, Prof. Patricia MBAH, Nigeria Liaison for her participation with ten participants from academic institutions and social associations in

Nigeria, Dr. Esther MALAMA from Zambia. We also thank Prof. Dr. Barbara FREYTAG-LEYER, Fulda University of Applied Sciences, Fulda, Germany and Prof. Dominique

A LEARNERS PERSPECTIVE: CLOSING EVENT EUROPEAN PROJECT M-HOUSE

"A year ago I read in the IFHE Newsletter about the pilot of the course "**Business skills explorer**". I subscribed because participating was a chance to reflect on doing business from a home-situation. I am self-employed and I am interested in issues related to working at home, especially from a family farming perspective. The E-learning way was new to me and I could do this at home in the Netherlands in my own time. On 5th October 2015 I had the chance to present my experiences at the closing event of the M-HOUSE Project in Brussels as a Testimonial to a European audience.

In the beginning of the course I needed some more time to address the assignments of the modules and plan them in my weekly schedule including time for rethinking daily tasks, such as the method of budgeting. Or about events which are not regular, for example, how I would handle moving our household, or the organising of a family event of which I was proud. Preparing the English-posts on the platform was a useful exercise too. I liked to try out the different tools of all the eight modules of the course. I got new ideas through the communication platform with other mostly younger participants. I experienced that intercultural communication in this way is fruitful. Using a mind-map and a giant card gave a quick visual result in the organising of a group event. This course also stimulated the communication within my household. I interviewed one of my sons about conflict styles in situations at school or during free time. The modules "**Problem Solving and Brand Your Self**" were the most important to me. The first pilot course I participated ended in January this year. In that period I usually do tax-paying administration and set yearly goals. This time I used the SWOT analysis tool and the canvas-model for this purpose.

The course "**Business Skills Explorer**" gave me an overall view of important topics of business skills and E-learning. It broadened my resources. I experienced opportunities in my network afterwards. Such as writing an article in a book with oral-history interviews. The line "**turn it into your story**" used at every module still pops up in my mind and keeps me focused on my goals."

The Textiles and Design Committee hopes you have previously read our Newsletter articles about the 2016 Textile Challenge. The Swiss IFHE has informed the T&D Chair of their intention to participate. The US IFHE is in process of collecting fabrics for its textile map. PLEASE contact the T&D Chair, Mary Turner GILLILAND (mltg@aol.com), with the coordinator's name and e-mail address if your country is planning to participate. Our Korean colleagues need to know what size room to reserve for the exhibit. If enough countries wish to be a part of this project, it will proceed. The T&D chair must hear from your country before the end of March 2016, or we cannot

continue with our plans. To recap the previous information:

The 2016 Textile Challenge will consist of IFHE member-country maps, constructed by IFHE Members and made of textiles from each state/province/region of that country (If a region has no textile industry, represent it with a fabric showing regional symbols, such as animals, flowers, geographic/historic sites, or the like). Maximum dimensions are one square meter, and each piece must include a method for display on a wall (e.g. a frame or sleeve with rod). Each textile exhibit shall include this information: the country name, the names of those who constructed it, and the following

explanations: Inspiration, Materials, and Techniques. Each exhibit application shall be accompanied by a photograph or preliminary sketch of the exhibit. Only one map per country may be submitted, but any number of people may work on it. One IFHE Member shall be selected as the coordinator for each project. THE HONDURAS INITIATIVE PARTNERSHIP UPDATE

Significant progress has been made during Phase 1 of the Honduras Initiative that was first reported in the June and again in the September 2015 issues of "Home Economics News". Beginning in April 2015, at the invitation of IFHE, exploration began with Sra. Leda HERNANDEZ of NGO Global Honduras to determine how Home Economics programs could help educate youth for productive, sustainable life in Honduras as opposed to their fleeing the country illegally.

A NEW MODEL of collaboration has been formed that includes IFHE, IFHE-US, AAFCS Global Perspectives Community, International Home Economics Services, the Disaster Assistance Partnerships, the Manitoba Association of Home Economists and individual Caribbean and other Home Economists in cooperation with the IFHE Region of the Americas.

Phase 1 is nearly complete after the visits made by Dr. Mary KEITH, IHES Board and Sra. Leda HERNANDEZ to several sites in Honduras in October. Meetings were held in Santa Barbara at Centro Cultural Hibueras with staff, teachers, youth, parents, and trainers. In Arada, they met with town council and the mayor, visited an agricultural centre, health clinic, and another centre where Centro works. Several areas of cooperation were identified, including culinary and nutrition, tourism and hotel related areas and financial literacy/management. They also met with the Polyvalente Institute in Marcala that offers degrees in Health and Nutrition, Accounting and Finance, Humanities and Business.

Teachers there were very interested in how we might assist them in strengthening their programs. They met with the Mayor of Marcala that reiterated often-repeated frustration with need for work and jobs for youth, poor infrastructure, lack of government support, corruption and violence, especially against women. A full report of the trip is pending. Clearly the need is great and Home Economists have skills that could be of much help

to Honduran youth if, in Phase 2, we can identify specifics to guide us in a productive direction. Tentatively, Nancy GRANOVSKY is planning to hold workshops this spring with schools interested in partnering with our Honduras Initiative.

In the meantime, IHES and the DAP have moved forward with assisting two schools in Honduras. We have sent five heavy duty sewing machines and five large boxes of fabrics and sewing supplies to the Instituto Polivantende "Republica de Venezuela" in Jutiapa, Altantida, Honduras and five boxes of sewing supplies will be taken with a group going to Honduras from Meredith College over the holidays. They are teaching sewing skills to youth in a new school setting.

The needs in Honduras are so great that we decided that sending some materials immediately would be helpful too. Long-term involvement will be necessary for lasting assistance to take hold. Thorough planning within the Partnership and with the schools and involvement of many professionals will be required for success with the Honduras Initiative. Two planning sessions for our professionals have been requested for summer, 2016 and all home economists are welcome to participate: One is proposed at AAFCS Convention in Washington in June and one for the IFHE Congress in Korea in July. Watch for further details about the Honduras Initiative.

IFHE-US had a series of successful activities during the American Association of Family & Consumer Sciences Annual Conference & Expo in Jacksonville, Florida in late June.

The cultural evening is always a special time and as usual the program, music, and food were excellent. We were able to add money to the development fund and are looking forward to seeing funds awarded to projects during the 2016 Congress.
