Khartoum, Sudan

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Last week, on 8th March, the UN celebrated the International Women's Day under the theme **"Time is Now: Rural and urban activists transforming women's lives"**. The Campaign theme is **"Press for Progress"**. Now, more than ever, there is a strong call-to-action to press forward and progress gender parity. There is a strong call to Press for Progress motivating and uniting friends, colleagues and whole communities to think, act and be gender inclusive.

IFHE will continue to work to improve the standard of living of women as individuals or within their families and eliminate all forms of discrimination against them. 1st March was the UN Zero Discrimination Day and on 21st March we will celebrate the International Day for the Elimination of Racial Discrimination. Such celebrations aim to help young people voice their opinions, find ways to fight racism, and promote tolerance in their communities and in their lives and making our planet a better place for the living of

individuals and families in peace and prosperous.

We cannot mention March celebrations without recognising our **World Home Economics Day** on 20th March under the theme **"Home Economics Literacy: Skills for Healthy and Sustainable Cooking"**. Many different factors affect the type of food chosen and consumed, but the skill to prepare appropriate food plays an important role. A lack of skills in preparing and cooking food could affect health as it can limit choices. Therefore, building people's confidence in cooking food make individuals and families healthier.

Since nutrition is known to play a major role in health, food preparation and cooking skills have the potential to affect one's well-being and health. At a time of increased concern regarding food sustainability, food skills go beyond cooking and nutrition, with food choices having implications for society. In an era where diet-related diseases continue to spread in large parts of the world, there

is great need to improve public health. Reviving cooking skills, as well as building confidence to prepare good food, may have an enormously positive impact on food choice and dietary intake. Potential ideas are to include cooking classes in school curricula more widely and to establish structures in the home that make cooking a fun experience for all ages.

Let us take this opportunity to stress the need for better and healthier cooking skills and call for having family meals and other aspects of meal structure, including eating dinner with others, which is significantly associated with a more nutritionally adequate diet, with higher intakes of fruit, vegetables, grains and calcium-rich foods.

I would like to take this opportunity to encourage all Home Economists to take part in promoting healthier cooking skills at the global level.

Ahfad University for Women (AUW) in Khartoum, Sudan.

With view to the 110th Anniversary of the IFHE, Sidiga WASHI presented for the first time a video to the theme **"IFHE a (1)10 years window"**.

The video shows the IFHE Activities in the last ten years, it can be seen on the IFHE Website. She also launched the attractive design of the new IFHE Website, www.ifhe.org.

For the first time IFHE Delegates and IFHE Members, who were not able to travel to Khartoum had the chance to watch the IFHE Council 2018 via livestream online. Also the candidates for the position of IFHE President-Elect could give their presentations online via Skype® to the participants from far away from Sudan. All watching delegates were very grateful for this chance and acknowledged the big efforts and commitment of the technical team of Ahfad University for Women, which had overcome all technical challenges. Delegates Assembly and Professional Outlook

The IFHE Members and Delegates present at the Council 2018 discussed the topics of the agenda and exchanged experiences from their perspectives. The discussions about IFHE Finances and Membership fees, the next IFHE events such as the IFHE Annual Meeting 2019 in Trinidad & Tobago and most of all the IFHE Congress 2020 in Atlanta demonstrated the high commitment of the delegates for the IFHE.



It was also obvious that the challenges and conditions for the IFHE Members and Home Economics Experts are very different in the many IFHE Countries around the world. Another important aspect of the meeting in Sudan were the questions:

- What are the most relevant professional Home Economics questions and topics related to the developments and challenges for families and
- In which way can Home Economics related fields contribute to the Sustainable Development Goals, and
- In which way can the IFHE Programme Committees contribute to the IFHE Congress 2020?

The delegates discussed these questions in working groups and defined topics, tasks and activities for different IFHE Programme Committees. A suggestion was to substitute committees with working groups to address especial topic and when dealt with then a new group forms.

The Council in Sudan was a great experience for all European IFHE Members and delegates, who visited Khartoum for the first time. The wonderful hospitality, the well-organised meetings and social events gave inspiring impressions of the culture in Sudan. The many tours gave interesting insights in different areas of Home Economics in Sudan. A special highlight was the Nile Tour for all participants.

Thank you to all members of the wonderful Organising Team and most of all to IFHE President Sidiga WASHI, who made this special Council 2018 a great success and unforgettable IFHE Event.

Besides the welcome remarks of Professor Gasim BADRI, President of AUW, H.E. State Minister who presented the speech of H.E. Ms Mashair A. Alamin ALDAWALB, Minister of Security and Social Development presented Opening remarks to the participants of the Symposium.

Recognition Awards were presented to Ms Sitana BADRI & Mr Hamza MUDATHER, two staff of the school of Health Sciences who are over 85 years old and contributed to teaching at the school until today.

Keynote speaker Prof. Dr. Seema PURI, Department of Nutrition, Institute of Home Economics, University of Delhi India presented to the theme **“Ensuring successful Ageing in the 21st Century: Challenges for Home Economists”**.

Other keynote speakers demonstrated the developments and consequences related to the increase of elderly people around the world and highlighted the challenges for societies from different perspectives. KHARTOUM FROM A PERSONAL POINT OF VIEW

Our first time in Africa and in Khartoum. IFHE always gives a chance to explore places in the world, where you normally would not come to. I will take this opportunity also in future without any official position!



First of all: The Symposium (with appr. 200 participants) and the IFHE Council Meeting was perfectly organised by Sidiga WASHI, IFHE President and professor at Ahfad University for Women

(AUW). Her team not only took care of all participants for their personal comfort, meals etc., but also the technical staff and the bus-transfer-people did a successful and wonderful job! I had to learn, that tipping is not familiar in Khartoum, I was told, it is like this in all North-Sudan. We felt ourselves safe at any time and everywhere and people were all really friendly, saying hello and “welcome to Sudan”, whenever we were around.

Apart from the efficient meetings of IFHE, especially the afternoon for the Programme Committees, Mathias (my husband, the photographer) and I tried to get as much of a touristic insight as possible: Sidiga accompanied a group of us to watch the dance and meeting of the Suffi-derwishes at a cemetery in front of a mosque. We drove to the huge camel market, some members of our group had camel rides, In addition to the Nile boat trip for all the IFHE Participants and supporters of our meetings, we made an individual programme: We have seen boat-building carpenters, working in the old traditional way, we visited the impressive fish market with loads of, and an incredible variety of, fish out of the Nile.

We have seen the oldest Mosque of Khartoum, Farouk and some others. As some other members of our IHFE Group, we took hours to read the English explanations in the impressive Sudan Museum, which was round the corner to our hotel. Our hotel “Grand Holiday Village” built in English colonial times,



about 100 years ago, used to be the best one in Khartoum. It has been renovated with lights and air condition, now under Pakistan management, but with African way of life.

Of course we were at Tuti-Island, where the White and the Blue Nile confluence. We took a driver and made a daytrip to Sabalooqa, the place with the “6th Cararact of the Nile”, passing many farms and cattle-markets in the North, along the main road to Port Sudan and then going left through the desert to this wonderful and peaceful place.

We met and talked to a group of students from Bahri-University, of geology and agricultural studies, ate fried fish in pieces and bread by hand with them, and could make a tour round the big Nile, more looking like a big lake, getting close to the birds-sanctuaries. Really a totally different, green and fruitful world compared to the lively and dusty city of Khartoum. The food court at the new central Al Waha Mall could be in any city of the world and was full of youngsters.

All in all, it was a wonderful stay in Khartoum; we owe Sidiga and her team a lot of thanks and really admire the management they had for everything. We felt safe and comfortable and have the feeling that we not only had an effective IFHE Council but also a wonderful time with many insights into Sudanese life.

All who did not come really missed a superb time!

Victoria W. THORESEN, UNESCO Chair for Education about Sustainable Lifestyles and Professor of Education at Hedmark University College in Norway and Adrian HENDRIQUES Middlesex University, UK gave inspiring keynote speeches. They discussed with the participating experts as well as with the project team concepts and aspects of an innovative teacher training for sustainable consumption and production in vocational trainings. One special topic was, in which way trainees, learners can be supported to discover a sustainable mindset and in which way a sustainable mindset can be assessed?

In a second phase, the discussion of the professional and sustainable competences, the concepts, structures and tools for the four modules of the innovative ProfESus blended learning teacher training gave valuable references for the project partners.

BIG INTEREST FOR THE PROFESUS BLENDED LEARNING COURSE

More than 50 participants from 15 different countries registered for the ProfESus innovative teacher training, which will be conducted as a blended learning course. The first presence phase took place at the University College of Agrarian and Environmental Pedagogy in Vienna, Austria at the end of February.



Teachers, students and lecturers in teacher trainings in the field of Home Economics met in Vienna to discuss in the first sessions the significance of sustainable development and the role of teachers in vocational education in guest-orientated businesses. The highly motivated and committed participants worked in groups together on relevant topics of sustainability in vocational education.

What does it mean to act sustainably in guest-orientated businesses?



During an excursion course participants explored innovative guest-orientated businesses. These hotels, restaurants or social institutions focus on social and/or environmental aspects.

In the café so-called “Vollpension”/“Full board” Grandmas and Grandpas are working beside young staff members. The variety of delicious cakes, baked by the Grandmas is a very successful business concept which enables elderly people to generate an additional income and to contribute to a wonderful atmosphere in the café. The elderly people are working ten hours a week and they can choose the day and time they want to do their work. There is a long list of elderly women and men, who would like to work in this special café.

Another example was a mushroom business which uses coffee ground from hotels and restaurant to grow mushrooms. In the hotel called “MAGDAS” - a former home for elderly people – all rooms are furnished with upcycled furniture. Each room is uniquely furnished. Refugees from many different countries are working in the various areas of the hotel and are trained, so that they can apply for a professional jobs after four to maximum five years.

A highlight of the excursion day was the visit to the United Nations in Vienna. Besides a guided tour through the impressive buildings, the chief of the United Nations Information Department presented the background of the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) and pointed out the significance of teachers and education to support the SDGs. He demonstrated examples in which way in many places of the world governments, communities, businesses are committed to act sustainably.

Role of Teachers and Education for sustainable Development

Based on the general questions about the significance of sustainable development, the dimensions of sustainability and the challenges to

transform societies to more sustainable development, the course participants discussed new approaches to support a sustainable mindset in students. Key aspects of a sustainable mindset were presented by Anne FOX, ProfESus Project partner, Denmark. In addition the participants got to know the concept of “green pedagogy” presented by Johanna MICHENTHALER, University College of Agrarian and Environmental Pedagogy, Vienna, which is built on the constructivism which focuses on learner-centred methods. The special aim of the ProfESus teacher training is the implementation of the sustainable competences of the United Nations Economic Commission for Europe (UNECE) in combination with professional competences into the learning activity plan.



Erasmus+

The participants built groups based on their specific subject interest to create examples for specific cases related to professional competences and assigned relevant UNECE competences for a learning activity plan.

At the end of the first presence phase the international group of participants stated that they enjoyed the exchange of information and experiences as well as an inspiring Module 1. With high motivation they travelled home to start the online learning phase until the end of May.

They are looking forward to meeting together in June for the last Module 4 in Finland.

- The venue **“Congress Hotel: Atlanta Hyatt Regency”**




- Tentative Program was approved

Conference Destination

Ondo State, Nigeria was created on 3 February 1976 from the former Western State. It originally included what is now Ekiti State, which was split off in 1996. Akure is the state capital. The state contains eighteen Local Government Areas, the major ones being Akoko, Alur, Okitipupa, Ondo, and Owo. The majority of the state's citizens live in urban centers.

The big government universities in Ondo state are the Federal University of Technology, Akure and the Adekunle Ajasin university, Akungba/Akoko.

Ondo State was created in 1976 and is bounded in the East by Edo State, in the North by Kwara State, in the West by Oyo and Ogun States and in the South by the Atlantic Ocean. The State is dominated by Yorubas who speak various dialects of the Yoruba language such as the Akoko, Akure, Apoi, Idanre, Ikale, Ilaje, Ondo and the Owo and a minority speaking the Ijaw Language. Ondo people are known for their unique Asoke called Alaari.

The people are mostly subsistence farmers, fishermen and traders. The people are lovers of arts, music and literature. A variety of tourist attractions abound in the state. Among the leading spots are the historic Idanre Hills with guest-houses built by the government.

Others are Ayetoro Community of Holy Apostles, the Owo Museum of Antiquities, Oke Maria at Oka-Akoko, the Palace of the Deji of Akure, Ebomi Lake at Ipesi-Akoko and Iho Eleru at Isarun.re.
